**RE:** Mosquito Fire Recovery update

Please accept this memo as a weekly update to the activities surrounding the County of El Dorado's recovery from the Mosquito Fire as managed by the Recovery Operations Center's (ROC) co-directors Sgt. Moke Auwae and me.

### Environmental Management

- **Phase 1 – Hazard Household Waster clean up**
  - Began on October 6, 2022 and is 87% complete

### Land Use

- **Building Inspection status**
  - Creating public-facing map that should be completed this week.

### Health and Human Services Agency

- **Social Worker**
  - On October 5, 2022, the Social Worker and Mental Health Worker went to Buckeye Mobile Home Park to provide support to Mosquito survivors. Both staff went to the Buckeye Mobile Home Park in Georgetown with Library HUBs staff. The Library set up a resource table and a activity booth for kids in the area. All the residents in the community were evacuated by the Mosquito Fire but there was no damage from the fire there. Staff handed out a quite a few Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP) Applications and CalWORKs forms (Low income families). One individual had a temporary loss of employment and could not get her full paycheck to cover last month's rent, and she is being connected to the Community Foundation for assistance.
  - On October 9, 2022, staff attended the Georgetown Founders Day event from 10:00pm – 2:00pm.
- **Mental Health Worker**
  - Creating support groups for Mosquito survivors and will distribute that information as soon as possible.
  - In discussions with EDCOE and Black Oak Mine Unified School District to provide to additional support to Georgetown Elementary School.
